Aiden walks down the hallway at the **ECA** holding his father's hand. He has a bubbly, excited feeling in his stomach; he wants to run home but does not want to miss what is ahead of him. He cannot speak because he is so scared and anxious. He walks through the door to his new classroom with his father and is met by a shirt, a Saint Joseph's shirt. He hears his father say, "He is a little bit nervous; will he be alright?" The next thing Aiden knows is that the shirt has become Miss Heather with a smile, whispering in his ear, "Don't worry, Aiden. I'm a bit scared; it's my first day, too. Let's help each other out."

The start of the year brings excitement, change, and transition. It's normal for young children to be both excited and fearful about the idea of going to another classroom. On the one hand, moving up is what the "big kids" do, and it is a mark of children's advancement. Moving up represents a big unknown, which can be frightening to some children who have grown attached to their current teacher. Children can be helped to mentally and emotionally prepare for this transition to school by talking about what to expect in their next environment. Visiting the class and meeting the teacher ahead of time can also make

it less traumatic for everyone. No matter what preparation occurs, it is normal for both children and parents to cry a little bit on the first day or two. Our transition process is designed to build trust between the children, their teachers, and their parents. Our focus on trust builds community. Everyone helps everyone in order to provide an environment where our children can relax, observe, learn, and grow.

Water Treatment Wonders

Have you ever wondered what happens to used water after it goes down the drain? **Third Graders** learned all about wastewater treatment when they visited the South Central Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant in Delray Beach on Friday, January 20th. As part of the tour of the facility, students were able to see what happened to water from the time it entered the plant dirty and dangerous to the time it left cleaned and sanitized through biological and chemical processes. Students learned that currently 50% of Florida's drinking water is used for irrigation. By using reclaimed, treated water, we save millions of gallons of drinking water each year. Students also learned that this wastewater treatment plant sells the leftovers from the process to a facility that pelletizes it for use as fertilizer. Places that use reclaimed water for irrigation display a small purple sign along the roadside. See how many "Reclaimed Water" signs you can find on your way to school!
